


## ELSIE JOYCE HARDING 3/2/1917 - 25/2/2010



February 3<sup>rd</sup> 1917 at 'The Cedars' in Lyndhurst where her mother worked as a housekeeper while her father was serving as a gunner in WW1. Her younger sister, Georgina was also born at Lyndhurst in July 1920. The family moved to Pamphill near Wimborne, in 1920 where her father worked as a gardener, and Joyce began school here.




She began teaching at Lytchett Matravers, later moving to the Trenchards School, a private school in Winton.





uring a meeting at Drummond Hall in Boscombe, Joyce felt called to go to India as a missionary herself and in 1949, she and Olive Rogers sailed from Tilbury docks. The first six years were spent in a boarding school in Chettipetta, teaching English and Scripture, and learning the Telugu language and Indian customs.

Hostel, then a few months later a fire burned the thatched roof. The calamity proved a blessing in disguise as Tear Fund donated a large sum and others gave gifts so a new building of brick and cement could be built. Over the years other buildings have been added.

John and Eileen Cossins travelled to Sy the hostel several times to help as needed and became involved in the work.





In 1954, the school moved to some fine buildings in the Nidadavol area, one building was a home for Mr. and Mrs. Tilsley and the other became known as Hebron Hostel. In 1969 a cyclone caused much damage to the

ordon Loy also helped with some of the building work.

The majority of staff in the hostel were 'old students' who returned to help.



A s well as caring for girls in the Hostel, workshops and retreats were organised for Sunday school teachers. Each year a special mission was held and also a Holiday Bible school. Women's work was carried out in the villages and Outreach was done in jungle areas.

Just before retiring Joyce was able to

open Hermon School in new buildings in the grounds of Hebron Hostel for infant and Junior children. Jennie Grace Prabhakar, an Indian teacher came to take over.

In 1994 Joyce reluctantly returned to England, but India was never far from her mind. From her home in England she kept in close contact with Hebron Hostel, sending out
